


Vocal Health and the Aging Voice

Dr. Lisa A. Billingham is professor of Choral Music Education at George Mason University, where she conducts the University Chorale and teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in choral music education. She is the past-president for the Virginia State Chapter of the American Choral Directors Association and is a planning committee member and campus liaison for the Annual Voices United Conference. She holds a DMA in Choral Conducting from the University of Arizona, an MM in Choral Conducting from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and a BME in Choral Music Education from Indiana University (Bloomington).

Choral directors face the aging voice on a weekly basis in rehearsal and services. A true and loving conductor listens to the choir with an ear to change in tone quality, breath support, and overall vocal health. Listening to the voices of your choir members as they speak can give you an indication if there is dryness, hoarseness, or even vocal damage. Pops in the speaking voice can indicate the side effects of dehydration which can be a side effect of medication or overuse. I encourage all of my choristers to have a water bottle in rehearsal and to drink at least 16 ounces of water or herbal tea (decaffeinated) prior to sleep. As Americans we are quite addicted to our morning coffee. Caffeine is an agent that dehydrates the voice. We have members of my choir volunteer to bring cases of water to the choir room; if you have a five-gallon dispenser it is better for the environment!

Teach with persistence and show love

John 13:34 "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another."

Checking in with your choir members consistently shows care, concern, and also gives you information regarding any health-related or physical changes that may be happening with your singers. Over time, the musculature that supports the lower abdominal wall can affect the ability for deep and consistent breath patterning in your singers. Encourage your singers to participate in some form of movement class whether it be Tai Chi, meditation, or participation in a walking club. Post information!

The physical apparatus of the voice ages with the rest of the body. Encouraging breathing warm ups, and connecting them to life outside the choir space can be tantamount to continuing vocal health. I regularly practice Dr. Andrew Weill's patterns of 4:7:8 breath patterning and find that they support my physical and emotional health. Vocal health rules apply for all of the singers in your ensemble. It is entirely possible that the singers in your choir may not sing between rehearsal and services, or even do basic phonation if they live alone. Encourage your members to connect with one another; this will prove vital to keeping their voices limber. Breathing exercises and warm-up strategies that are consistent (but not repetitive) will keep your singers engaged. I use imagery in warm-ups for breathing that give singers an opportunity to relate to common experiences. Here's an example: Imagine you are picking up a ball from waist height in front of you; inhale, pick up the ball, then exhale as you pass the imaginary ball to someone next to you. You can also model healthy body alignment. Singers can breathe deeper by placing their thumbs on their waist at the side and rolling their hand down with the pointer finger to identify the hip joints. Encourage the singers to then take a deep breath which will be supported from the strength of the hip joint.

Instead of trying to explain the Trinity, why not either just read the quote from the *Catechism* and sit down, or refresh the assembly with the various ways we pay homage to the Trinity not in words, but in signs and symbols such as the sign of the Cross—a sign of our Baptism even without words. Or how about explaining the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed and why we have both?

Or go out on a limb and preach about mystery. What is a mystery? It's something that can't be explained. So why do we keep trying? Perhaps not everything must be explained in words. A kaleidoscope or a shamrock says more than words could. People are fascinated by mysteries!
